

# Shinjuku Walking Map

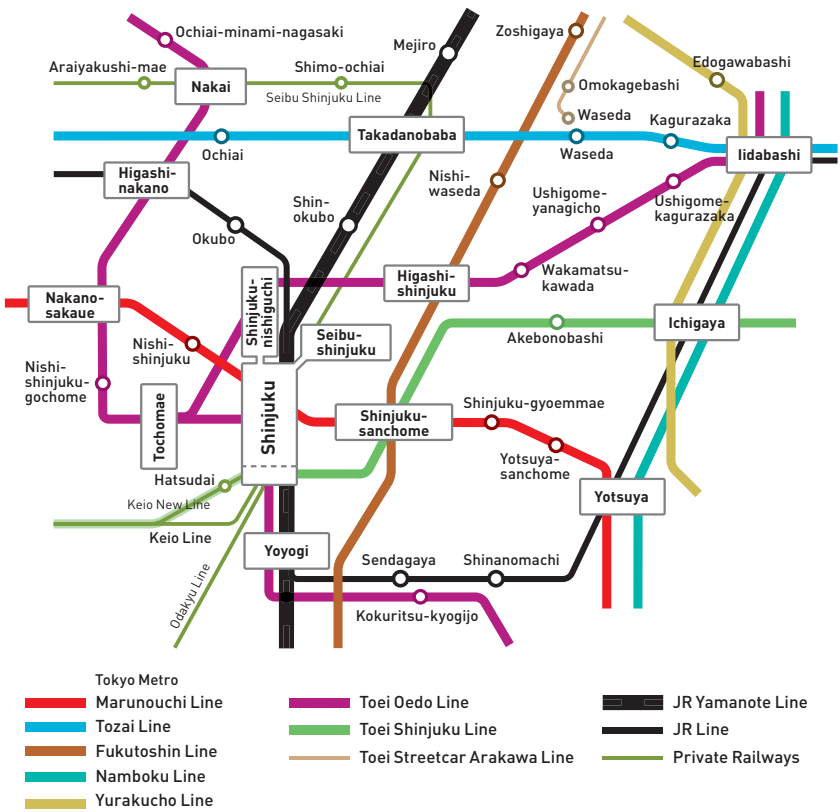
## Ten Different Ways to Enjoy Shinjuku

Shinjuku is a vibrant and exciting community where many people live, work, study, play, and meet others. The name evokes images of a busy entertainment district, studded with well-known landmarks like the skyscraper district, Kabukicho, and the busiest station in Japan, but this area, which has carved out its own special history since the Edo period, has many other faces as well.

Shinjuku is home to numerous ancient shrines and temples and appears in many historical novels. It features towns and hills whose names remind us of its old Edo-period heritage. There is abundant greenery throughout the Shinjuku Gyoen National Garden, spaces for rest and relaxation like the outer moat of Edo Castle, and ruins and monuments connected with such cultural figures as Natsume Soseki, Hayashi Fumiko, and Saeki Yuzo. With cultural facilities that include movie theaters, theaters for dramatic and comedic productions, and event halls, Shinjuku is not lacking for interesting places to visit.

This map divides Shinjuku into 10 areas and provides walking routes through each. We hope that you will discover something new to love about the exciting city of Shinjuku!
